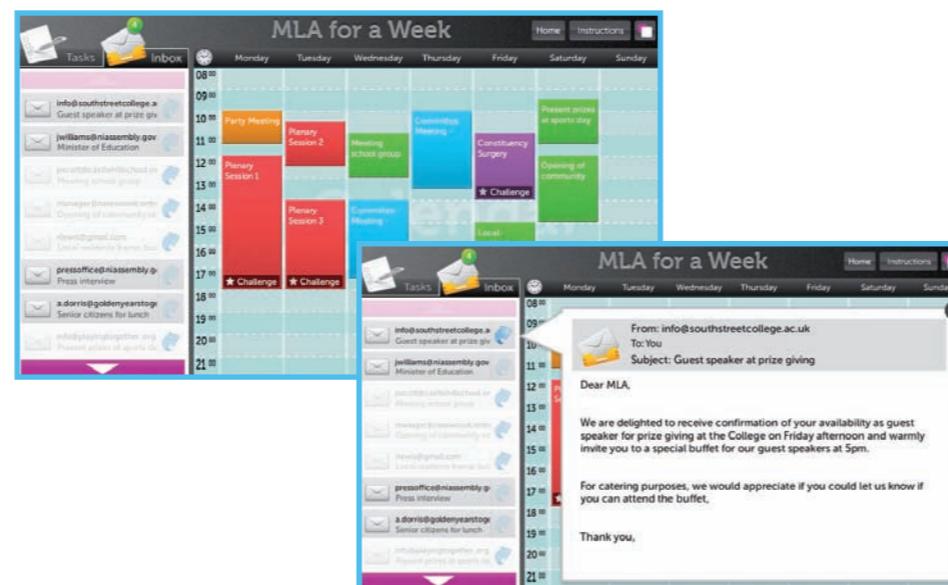
You must organise your diary to fit Assembly work and constituency commitments into the week.

Online Activity

In MLA for a Week your pupils experience life as an MLA. They become familiar with the work of an MLA by organising their online diary of Assembly and constituency commitments. They also face the MLA challenges of holding a Press Conference and Constituency Surgery, asking questions at Question Time and Writing a Speech.



How to Use the Multimedia

Use this activity to learn about the part an MLA plays in the Northern Ireland Assembly and their constituency. The MLA Challenges explore skills relevant to role of an MLA and the study of spoken language through English Language. This includes understanding audience and purpose at a press conference or using open and closed questions during Question Time. Video examples of MLAs debating in the Assembly Chamber are an opportunity to look at techniques for writing and delivering speeches.

To organise their diary, the pupils should double click to activate the items in the Tasks and Inbox tabs. They should read each item to find out where to place it in the diary.

Click on:

- the blue arrow to drag activated items to the correct slot in the diary;
- a diary block to get more information about that task; and
- any Challenges stars inside a block to jump to an MLA Challenge.

The diary is complete when all the tasks and emails are in place. A counter above the Tasks and Inbox tabs indicates how many items still need to be addressed.

MLA Challenges can also be accessed individually from the main menu of MLA for a Week.
